








Death By Neurological Criteria In The Philippines: Levels Of Awareness, Compliance And Obstacles to Brain Death Declaration

	<p>✓ 74.7% were not aware of the PNA Brain Death Criteria</p> <p>✓ 59% did not consider brain death as a legal declaration of death.</p>
	<p>Indications for Brain Death Determination (BDD)</p> <p>✓ 46% Prognostication</p> <p>✓ 36% Rationale for withholding treatment</p>
	<p>Conclusion: 2017 PNA Brain Death Criteria is poorly understood by physicians in the Philippines. The lack of standardization and training is the most important obstacle to brain death declaration.</p>

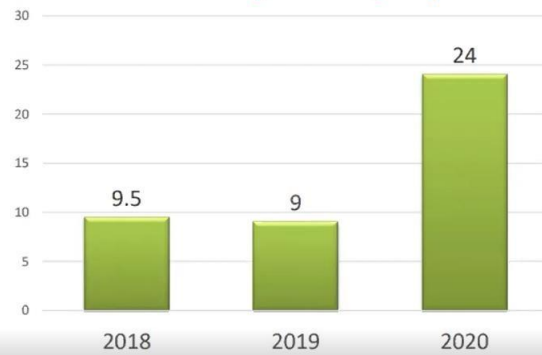

Outcomes from ODISSeA

- **41** actual deceased organ and tissue donations registered in 2020 compared with only **28** in 2019.
- This was despite the transplantation programme was inactive for several months due to COVID-19.
- This achievement could be attributed to the implementation of the **ODISSeA project** as well as the formation of **Organ and Tissue Procurement Unit (UPOH)** in 16 focused hospitals in the country.

155% increment in consent rates in Malaysia since UPOH and ODISSeA program began in January 2020
